## Registration/Check-In

Monday, June 12, 2023 between 2:00 - 4:00 PM at the front desk of Branford College, located at 74 High St. New Haven, CT 06511. Room keys and meal cards will be distributed during this time. FTE staff will be on site from 2:00 PM on Monday, June 12th through 11:00 AM on Sunday, June 18th.

## Parking

The university provides limited visitor parking options on campus. Visitors can choose public parking or the limited Yale visitor lots. Parking fees are required at either option and are the responsibility of the participant. FTE does not cover the cost of parking.

## Housing

Students will stay in Branford College. Students will be housed two per room, separated by gender, or in singles located in larger suites. Bathrooms are gender specific and communal. FTE Program Coordinators reside in adjacent rooms to the students and are available 24 hours a day. Upon departure from the program, the dormitory room should look as it did when the student arrived.

Note: Dormitories at Yale University do not have air conditioning. You are welcome to bring fans, but portable A/C units are prohibited.

## Meals

Students will eat their meals together throughout the program in Berkeley Dining Hall - 205 Elm St., except for Thursday night's dinner – this meal is at the participant's own expense. Any extra snacks, outside of the program meals, will be at the participant's expense.

### Recreation Options

The Payne Whitney Gym will be available for participant use during recreation hours - please see the schedule for recreation times each day. Note - students must access the gym and stay with the group in our assigned area during recreation hours.

### Off Site Excursion

On Thursday afternoon, the group will leave for an off-site activity, traveling via private bus to IT Adventure Ropes Course. A parent waiver is required in order to participate. The waiver can be accessed here: <https://app.veriwaiver.com/#/public/108>. Please sign and submit waivers no later than May 31, 2023.

### Expenses

Program expenses, including room and board, will be paid for by the Foundation for Teaching Economics (FTE). Participant expenses include travel to and from the program site, and any additional incidental expenses. It will be your responsibility to have enough cash to handle incidentals. Neither FTE staff nor Yale University will cash any checks. Please do not bring a large amount of cash to the program.

All keys and access/meal cards must be returned at the end of the program. Participants will be financially responsible for lost keys or keys that are not returned at check-out; FTE will not cover lost or unreturned keys. Participants will be charged \$50 for lost/unreturned room keys and \$5 for lost or unreturned meal cards.

### Personal Supplies

Bring items that will make your stay comfortable, including personal hygiene items and shower slippers/flip flops. All bedding, linens and towels are provided by Conference Services. All classroom supplies will be provided by FTE. Neither Yale University nor FTE can assume responsibility for your personal belongings - Laptop computers are not required and bringing them is at the discretion of the participant.

### Dress Code

Classroom-appropriate, casual, comfortable clothing is the rule on campus. Shorts, t-shirts and jeans are acceptable. Shoes, sandals or flip flops must be worn to the classroom and dining room. Bring appropriate clothing and closed-toed shoes (that can get dirty) for the outdoor leadership activities and the optional recreation activities such as swimming, basketball and volleyball. Include a sweatshirt or warm jacket as it can be chilly in the evenings.

### Visitors

EFL is a program of strenuous learning. Classes begin after breakfast and continue at various times throughout the day until late evening the entire week. Since classes occupy most of the students' time, no visitors may be invited to the campus.

### Program Overview

Economics for Leaders represents a unique experience in economics education that brings together high school juniors and seniors selected for their leadership potential who want to study economics. The EFL one-week program encompasses 30 hours of instruction plus small group sessions and workshops. The combination of classroom instruction, question and answer sessions, small group discussion, and workshops presents information in a rich and varied format, encouraging active student participation. Economics professors selected nationwide for their expertise and teaching effectiveness lead classes using case studies to illustrate economics principles and leadership concepts.

EFL is designed to create a diverse learning environment for the students. In addition to study sessions, the program also includes leadership components which emphasize self-exploration through teamwork exercises. These activities provide a physical outlet and an enjoyable diversion from the economics lessons.

### Student Goals

1. Become articulate on the basic forces moving and coordinating the economy.
2. Learn about the economic aspects of select current national and international issues.
3. Gain leadership skills.
4. Foster a commitment to continued learning about economics and leadership.

### UCCS Graduate Credit

Registration is optional and is completed directly through UCCS online. Directions on how to enroll in this credit are included below. Please note - the deadline to register for credit with UCCS is July 31, 2023. There are additional reading and assignments that are required for UCCS credit that staff will discuss with students at the program. You may sign up for UCCS credit after you return from the program as the deadline is not until July. That being said, we HIGHLY RECOMMEND registering prior to the start of your program.

### Schedule

A final schedule will be distributed at program registration on Monday. The start and finish times of the program will not change whatsoever.

### SELECTED ATHLETIC FACILITIES

#### Yale Bowl

81 Central Ave

From downtown New Haven, go west on Chapel Street. Turn left on Derby Avenue (Rte 34) and follow signs to Yale Bowl. Completed in 1914, the Bowl has 64,269 seats, each with an unobstructed view of the field.

#### Payne Whitney Gymnasium

70 Tower Pkwy

Payne Whitney is one of the most elaborate indoor athletic facilities in the world. Architect John Russell Pope borrowed the design in part from England's Liverpool Cathedral.

#### Ingalls Rink

Designed by Eero Saarinen, Ingalls Rink (known affectionately as "The Whale") is one of the most distinctive skating rinks in North America.

#### Carol Roberts Field House

70 Central Ave; west of the Yale Bowl

Yale's first athletic facility dedicated exclusively to women's sports teams: softball and field hockey.

#### Bush Field

250 Derby Ave; south of the Yale Bowl

Bush Field is the 6,000-seat stadium where Yale plays its home baseball games.

#### Gilder Boathouse

280 Roosevelt Dr, Derby, CT [not shown on map]

This 22,400-square-foot boathouse on the Housatonic River is home to the Yale crew teams.

#### Golf Course at Yale

Four miles northwest of campus, this 18-hole championship facility designed by Charles Blair Macdonald in 1924 includes putting and chipping areas, a driving range, and a pro shop.

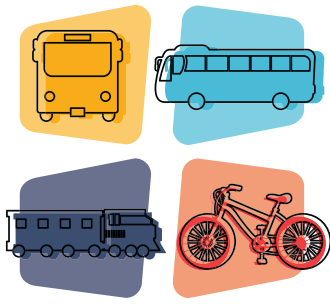

### **TRAIN OR BUS TRANSPORTATION**

Union Station is minutes from the Yale campus. Metro-North offers frequent train service between New Haven and New York City. Amtrak provides train service to New Haven from Vermont, Providence, and Boston to the north, and Washington, D.C., to the south, at prices that are competitive with air travel.

Union Station is also a Greyhound bus terminal. Once you reach Union Station, you can use a local taxi service to reach the Yale campus (a taxi stand is located at the station). A taxi will cost about \$10. Local shuttle and bus services are also available for travel between Union Station and Yale.



## Did you know you can earn college credit for your participation in Economics for Leaders this summer?

FTE has had a long and successful relationship with the University of Colorado, and the Department of Economics at the University of Colorado, Colorado Springs will offer undergraduate credit for students attending the Economics for Leaders programs. Economics 1320-701 is an undergraduate economics course for non-majors. Students who successfully complete the requirements will receive a transcript from UCCS, showing two semester hours of graded undergraduate credit.

**Course:** ECON 1320-701 (entry-level, elective, does not count toward an economics major)

**Fee:** \$244 (fee payable through the FTE/UCCS online portal; do NOT send payment to FTE)

**Transcripts:** Available from UCCS after grades are posted to your account. All grades for all EFL sessions will be submitted together in late August/Early September 2023. Transcripts can be ordered at [https://www.uccs.edu/lases/full\\_program\\_listing/fte](https://www.uccs.edu/lases/full_program_listing/fte). Pull down the “Student Resources” tab in the top menu bar.

### Requirements:

- Read a supplemental text (approximately 200 page paperback) and take an online exam via Canvas Instructure.
  - The test must be completed by July 31, 2023, or one week after your program ends for programs that start July 24 or later
    - It is highly recommended that students enrolling in the UCSB, UCLA, or University of Michigan programs complete the test BEFORE arriving at the program.
    - The test can be found in the UCCS Canvas Course site (see self-registration instructions below).
  - Required Text: *The Economics of Public Issues* by Miller, Benjamin and North (19<sup>th</sup> or 20<sup>th</sup> editions). Affordable used copies can be found on Amazon or other online book retailers.
    - *The Economics of Public Issues* is a very accessible reader, intended for introductory level college economics courses, but also used in many high school classrooms. It includes 30 short, 4-6 page chapters in which basic economic reasoning is used to explain contemporary mysteries of human behavior. - Attendance and participation in all scheduled activities during EFL
- A score of 75% or better on the EFL post-test, which will be given at the end of your program

### Registration Steps:

1. Enroll in Economics 1320-701 through UCCS – the following document will take you through the registration process with UCCS step by step. **NOTE** – this is a several step process which may take a week to 10 days to complete; you must first apply to and be accepted by the UCCS Extended Studies program. Follow each step carefully and note the July 31<sup>st</sup> registration deadline. Registration must be COMPLETE (not just started) by this deadline – give yourself plenty of time.
2. Use your UCCS login and password to access the UCCS Canvas course for Econ 1320-701 (the link for the Canvas site will be visible on your UCCS Student Portal after you register).
  - This is where you will take the online exam and where we will record your post-test and participation grades.
3. Attend your EFL program and sign the UCCS grade roster at the program, so the mentor teacher or professor can submit a participation grade for you.

We are excited to be able to offer you the chance to earn college credit at a very low cost and we look forward to your participation. We think you'll enjoy *The Economics of Public Issues* and your first taste of the kind of discussion and interaction you'll experience in college!
